

Industry Forum September Newsletter Exceptional is the new normal

One-hundred-year weather events that bring floods and fires in rapid succession; new diseases that strike with devastating speed and impact; populist forces increasingly influential in national governments; new technologies that offer unprecedented opportunities for benefit or harm: This is the unfamiliar territory in which, as we slowly emerge from the Covid 19 pandemic, not only businesses but the whole of society will need to operate. The implied effect of these four disruptive forces is that business-as-usual and policy-as-usual are no longer viable strategies for survival. The Industry Forum, therefore, intends, in future, to focus not just on improving dialogue between business and political policy makers, but also to look at key emerging issues and strategies for dealing with them. We hope that this will help business and policy makers to take nimble and effective actions, in order to adjust to turbulent times.

We are being cautious about the future safety of physical meetings, but will work with members towards their reintroduction. Our next four meetings will cover the revival of UK manufacturing, future UK/US trade, helping the UK become a new medicines powerhouse, and our Autumn Statement review of UK economic prospects. At present we are planning that the third of these, 'Can the UK become a new medicines powerhouse', will be a physical meeting and the others online.

How can we create a UK manufacturing renaissance?

Can the UK become a new medicines powerhouse?

The UK response to the COVID pandemic has established our global reputation as a scientific leader in life sciences. Key to this success has been the collaboration between the scientific community, the pharmaceutical industry, and the NHS. The recently published Life Sciences Vision sets out how the Government intends to build on this to position the UK as the leading global hub for life sciences. The challenge is to provide the right incentives for companies to work with the scientific community to develop and deliver new drugs and therapies in the UK, and to do this within an affordable budget, while ensuring that patients have access to new and innovative medicines. This policy workshop will look at existing hurdles and how these could be met with collaborative planning, streamlining approval procedures, and by new approaches to the access and uptake of new medicines. The expert panel will discuss the key policy initiatives needed, and what the benefits might be.

Key economic issues facing the UK for 2022 onwards

Towards the end of 2021, the UK will need to address a range of economic issues, and clarify its economic strategy. In addition to the impact of the pandemic, costly budget items will include transitioning to renewable energy, upgrading the physical and digital infrastructure, increasing expenditure on health and social care, investing in new technologies and more. In his November budget statement, the Chancellor will reveal whether he will follow the George Osborne approach, which led to a decade of austerity, or whether he plans to invest for growth. Before then, in this expert seminar, Andrew Smith, Chief Economic Adviser to the Industry Forum, will

outline the current position, and the options facing the Chancellor, before comments from further panel members and a general discussion.
